## ALPHA RHO CHAPTER AT GEORGIA TECH INVESTIGATION REMAINS ONGOING FRATERNITY TAKES ANY ACTIVITY SERIOUSLY WHERE ITS MEMBERS OR CHAPTERS ARE NOT IN LINE WITH VALUES

October 7, 2013: In response to the email, which was authored and distributed by an undergraduate member of the Alpha Rho chapter at Georgia Tech, the chapter has suspended the member in question and placed itself on suspension. An investigation remains ongoing by both the Phi Kappa Tau Fraternity and Georgia Institute of Technology. The chapter is cooperating fully.

The referenced email is extremely inappropriate and does not reflect the values of the Phi Kappa Tau Fraternity, Alpha Rho chapter or Georgia Institute of Technology. The Fraternity takes any activity seriously where its members or chapters are not in line with its commitment to learning, leading and serving. The written expression of this thinking by a member is disturbing to everyone associated with Alpha Rho chapter and the Fraternity.

Currently, Phi Kappa Tau Executive Offices staff, Institute officials, local board of alumni advisors and the regional director are working with chapter leadership to bring this matter to a swift resolution.

The mission of Phi Kappa Tau is to champion a lifelong commitment to brotherhood, learning, ethical leadership and exemplary character.

Founded in 1906 at Miami University in Oxford, Ohio, Phi Kappa Tau is a national fraternity that fosters three core ideals within its membership: learning, leading and serving. Currently, the Fraternity has 91 active groups—81 chapters and 10 colonies, or student organizations in the final stages of being installed as a chartered chapter.

Chartered in 1929 at the Georgia Institute of Technology in Atlanta, Alpha Rho chapter is a chartered chapter of the Phi Kappa Tau Fraternity and has initiated more than 1,000 members.
